COVID IN SCOTLAND - As of 14 October 2021

- It will continue to be the law, subject to exceptions, that face coverings must be worn in indoor public places and on public transport
 - NHS Test & Protect will continue to contact-trace positive cases. To assist with this there will be a continued requirement for indoor hospitality and similar venues to collect the contact details of customers.

ONSITE

- Please provide your COVID passport or evidence of a negative lateral flow test taken less than 24 hours before entering the event as we just want to keep everyone as safe as possible!
- Sanitising stations will be available on arrival and throughout the venue – please use these as you move about your event.
- Personal hand sanitiser – you are also encouraged to take your own sanitiser with you for personal use.
- Masks – you need to bring your own masks; please wear your mask at all times in public areas.

RESPONSIBLE VENUE OPERATIONS

- Venues and businesses may display the Check In Scotland Test and Protect QR code poster. This is the official NHS Scotland Test & Protect service which allow staff and visitors to businesses across Scotland check in and out of venues, supporting Scotland's national contact tracing services.

MESSAGE FROM DUNDEE & ANGUS CONVENTION BUREAU ABOUT ACCESSING HEALTH SERVICES IN SCOTLAND

We welcome all of our delegates to the region for the (INSERT CONFERENCE NAME).

Your wellbeing and safety is important to us. If you feel unwell at any time during your stay in our region, you should:

- Contact the trained first aiders at the venue or in your accommodation
- Call the NHS on 111 for urgent but not emergency care 24 hours a day www.nhs24.scot
- Call the NHS on 999 for emergency call only – for serious illness or injury or where life is at risk

Most accident and emergency (A&E) hospital departments are not currently accepting walk-in patients who are not serious emergencies, so you should always call the NHS on 111 or 999 (emergency). They will decide if you need an ambulance, an appointment at A&E or an appointment with a local doctor or health clinic.

Healthcare in Scotland for overseas visitors.

In Scotland, most health care is provided by the National Health Service (NHS). If you are coming to Scotland, you may have to pay for any health care you need while you are here and should get travel insurance with medical cover before your trip.

- What happens if I need treatment?
- Is all healthcare free for NHS patients?
